... And speaking of building in McCarthy, here's an update on the Kennicott flood damage from last fall. Thanks to the collective efforts of the National Park Service, the State of Alaska and many local volunteers, much of the flood damage in Kennicott has been repaired, if not just temporarily. New foot bridges now span National, Jumbo and Bonanza creeks, allowing for some awesome views of the damage done by the flooding, and making it possible to once again hike out to the glacier. Some of the historic buildings are still heavily damaged and will require some major effort, but the work is underway.

It seems the landscape is always changing in that part of our world - just last week we went out to McCarthy for a little post season R&R, and discovered that McCarthy Creek had flooded the week before, washing away our fire ring, and relocating much of itself on the far bank of the river bed. It's never dull out there in our Nation's largest National Park! Trip itineraries will remain the same essentially for next summer (Why mess with a good thing?) with no new trips in the works this year. But we would like to again point out, those two "new" itineraries, which premiered this summer: Interest was encouraging, but schedules conspired to only have a smattering of bodies spread over a variety of dates, precluding running any.

The 6-Day **Alaska Highlights Tour** still promises to touch upon just that – some of Alaska's highlights along the paved road system. It's a "tour" which means the comfort of indoor lodging each night, hot showers, and toilets that go whoosh. It features Denali for two nights, Fairbanks, Chena Hot Springs, Valdez and Prince William Sound. Even with an overnight at a hot springs, its spirit is still in the hallmark of adventure, exploring some of Alaska's lesser visited locales.
